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

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UPDATE: I-80 The I-80 Task Force has been following the expansion project closely.


As of today, PennDOT is one year out from filing permits. They know we are watching. Once the permits are filed, it will take a year for any approvals. There will be public forums, the PA Department of Environmental Protection will weigh in, the Monroe County Conservation District will conduct studies and more. We will keep up the good fight.

I also am working on an eminent domain bill to help protect the livelihoods of residents, businesses and municipalities. Eminent domain should be the LAST

resort and people deserve more than just fair market value for their property.

Remember: we want better roads, bigger shoulders and higher bridges, but we need to make this project fit, and right now it is oversized. Any reasonable person would understand that \$770 million is a ridiculous amount of money for a 3.5 mile project.

UPDATE: RT. 611 IN DELAWARE GAP The road closure along Rt. 611 has gone on way too long!

My office has been meeting regularly with local, state and federal officials regarding this unfortunate situation. Unfortunately, it seems that the PennDOT leadership team cannot seem to come to a resolution with the National Park Service regarding how to proceed with reopening this roadway.

The ongoing meetings continue to be drawn out, and frustrations are running very high, regarding the opening of Rt. 611 Delaware Water Gap.

After originally being told by PennDOT in December 2022 that retaining fences could not be erected to allow one lane to open while work is done to scale the wall, PennDOT said during a June 27, 2024 meeting that they could possibly install retaining fences. Many of us in the meeting were pleased to hear this, but disturbed that this could have potentially been done more than a year ago, allowing one lane of the road to be open.

Please understand that over the last 100 years, there has not been one death because of rockslides. Research proved that the rockslides only happen when there is record rainfall and weather. In the past, dedicated PennDOT workers have

cleaned up the rocks within six hours.

This is a PennDOT road. They have left us behind, but we meet every two weeks to get them to move in the right direction. I tell them every time that they put businesses out of business, the detour is too long and it is ruining other municipal roads, and there is no emergency exit plan when I-80 is backed up.

I hear all of your frustrations, and anger. I am on your side and I promise to keep fighting for you! I encourage you to contact the PennDOT leadership team and express the urgency to open up one lane and allow cars to travel.

Protecting Women's Health

The U.S. Supreme Court decision does not impact patients needing emergency abortion care in PA -

House Democrats will always defend reproductive rights and health.

Two years ago, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v Wade. While abortion is still safe and legal in Pennsylvania, we must ensure that our future generations will be guaranteed this right. With House Democrats in the majority, we work hard to protect a woman's right to health care and this session I voted for the following:

- Ensuring state-level access to contraceptives (H.B. 1140).
- Offering protection to people obtaining reproductive health services (H.B. 1786).
- Requiring providers to get consent during invasive medical procedures (H.B. 507/Act 31 of 2023).
- Requiring prenatal and postnatal health providers to distribute information related to postpartum depression to mothers and their families (H.B. 2127).



HELPING SENIORS AFFORD CABLE TV

For older Pennsylvanians, cable TV is a vital lifeline. Often it is the only source of important news and emergency information. Print media has transitioned to online, and many older adults cannot use, afford, or have access to the Internet. I introduced legislation (H.B. 2457) that would provide income-eligible older adults a yearly rebate on their basic tier cable TV when there is only one cable TV service provider available in their municipality.

STATE, SCHOOL RETIREES DESERVE A COLA

About eight months ago, I proudly joined my House colleagues in voting for a bill that would provide a cost-of-living increase to longtime retired public school teachers and state workers, some who have not received a cost-of-living adjustment in 20 years. Those who have been retired the longest would receive the largest adjustment. This would be for those retiring before July 2, 2001.

These are teachers and loyal public employees who gave so much to their communities and have been retired for many years. We owe them the dignity in retirement that they deserve. This adjustment is long overdue. It is shameful that the Republican-controlled state Senate has not brought this bill up for a vote. I encourage you to call your state Senator and ask them to support the COLA bill.

REMEMBERING MARION MUNLEY

I am proud to report that the PA House of Representatives adopted my **H.R. 339** to recognize Marion Munley, the first woman elected state representative from northeastern Pennsylvania. The measure designates Aug. 19, 2024, as "Marion Munley Day" in Pennsylvania. The significance of the date is Munley's birthday in 1906. She died in 1983. Through this resolution, we honor Marion Munley's memory by continuing to work toward a future where all Pennsylvanians can live together as equals. She left an indelible legacy, setting many precedents for women and achieving legislative victories in the pursuit of equality and fairness.

Munley grew up in Scranton and had an early interest in politics and government. In

1947, she won a special election to finish out her deceased husband Robert's term in the PA House of Representatives, becoming the first woman elected state representative from northeastern Pennsylvania. She was re-elected eight times, deciding not to run for re-election in 1964. During her tenure, she became the first woman elected Democratic Caucus secretary in the 300-year history of the legislature.

PRO-FAMILY, PRO-WORKER BILLS PASS THE HOUSE

These are some of the pro-family, pro-worker bills that have passed the House in the last year.

- ✓ H.B. 299 would create the Public Employees Occupational Safety and Health Act, which establishes workplace safety standards for public sector employees that are consistent with federal OSHA requirements.
- ✓ H.B. 413 would increase specifications for classifying employees as independent contractors in the construction industry.
- ✓ H.B. 577 would create the Keystone Saves Plan a voluntary retirement account for workers who don't have access to an employer-based plan
- ✓ H.B. 760 would allow workers' compensation claimants to have benefits delivered via direct deposit.
- ✓ H.B. 930 would ensure that workers who suffer from serious and permanent disfigurement are eligible for workers' compensation benefits, increases number of eligible weeks for compensation, and allows claimants to collect disability and disfigurement benefits simultaneously.
- H.B. 950 would guarantee workers the right to organize and collectively bargain and prohibits any other laws that may interfere with or diminish collective bargaining rights.
- ✓ H.B. 1449 would establish clear requirements that firms bidding on public infrastructure projects must meet, including having a state or federally registered apprenticeship program.
- ✓ H.B. 1465 would apply prevailing wage rates and minimum safety standards to all contracted construction work on underground systems regulated by the Pennsylvania Utility Commission.
- ✓ H.B. 1481 would extend eligibility for unemployment compensation to workers who are unemployed due to a work stoppage.
- ✓ H.B. 2153 would protect worker pay and prohibit the use of "split rates" by
 which some contractors pay workers at two different rates for the same job
 on the same day.



WORKING FAMILIES DESERVE A BREAK

I am proud to have worked with Gov. Josh Shapiro to deliver for working parents and caregivers as we more than tripled the state's Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit to help nearly a quarter-million Pennsylvania families keep more of their hard-earned money. The previous one-child credit of \$180 is up to as much as \$1,050, and the previous two-or-more children credit of \$360 is up to as much as \$2,100.

This is not just for child care. If you are paying for care of someone who is elderly or living with a disability, you could also qualify for the tax credit. If you qualify for the federal Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, you also qualify for the state credit.





PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATE PROGRAM IS BIGGER AND BETTER

You may be eligible for the expanded Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program and my office is here to help.

I was proud to vote for a law that expanded and improved the state's PTRR Program. The law raised the income limit to \$45,000 for homeowners and renters and raised the maximum rebate to \$1,000. Cost-of-living increases will keep pace with inflation so that seniors retain eligibility with modest raises in Social Security benefits.

The program benefits eligible Pennsylvanians aged 65 or older; widows and widowers aged 50 or older; and people with disabilities age 18 or older. Spouses, personal representatives, or estates may also file rebate claims on behalf of claimants who lived at least one day in 2023 and meet all other eligibility criteria.

SUPPORTING FIRST RESPONDERS



I was proud to vote for legislation that would make post-traumatic stress injury an eligible claim for first responders filing for workers' compensation. If enacted, Pennsylvania would be the 26th state to provide workers' compensation benefits to first responders suffering from PTSI.

I also voted to expand the Fire Company and EMS Grant Program by investing an additional \$30 million in grants to fire and EMS companies. Grants also could be used for cancer screening and other preventive health measures for first responders. The bill would make non-transport EMS squads grant-eligible and authorize a new Hazardous Materials Team and Specialty Team Grant Program.

First responders are the backbone of our public safety system, providing lifesaving care in all communities.



EQUITABLY FUNDING SCHOOLS WILL LOWER PROPERTY TAXES

There have been a lot of ads on social media and text messages going around about my vote to properly fund public schools.

Don't believe the lies! The 2024-25 state budget DOES NOT raise taxes!

The organization spreading these lies is funded by Jeffrey Yass, the richest man in Pennsylvania who is worried that he might make fewer millions. Meanwhile, the property taxes in Monroe and Pike counties have gone up repeatedly... year after year.

Despite what you may have heard, we have NOT voted on a bill that will close any cyber charter school. Anybody who sends their child to a cyber charter school can still do that. But your property taxes shouldn't be going to cyber charter schools so they can spend your hard-earned tax dollars on sports tickets and advertising.

For years, the public school districts in Monroe and Pike counties have been the most underfunded across the entire state, with local taxpayers footing the bill. After 20 years of Republican inaction, thanks to the House Democratic majority and the 2024-25 state budget, we can finally do something about that.

It's time to stop the bleed and fund our schools equitably!

SUPPORTING MENTAL HEALTH

Pennsylvania needs to fix its ailing mental health care system. The House has outlined and advanced a bipartisan plan (H.B. 849) that would allocate \$100 million in federal funds to address Pennsylvania's mental health needs, including investing in recruiting and retaining mental health professionals, expanding criminal justice and public safety programs, and preventing suicide.

We know the problems and we have solutions. Funding is available. The uses have been thoroughly vetted. It's time to get this money out the door to serve Pennsylvanians. Call your state Senator and tell them to support \$100 million for mental health needs.

The PA House passed a bill to exempt veterans' disability benefits from income requirements for:

The House passed the "VetConnect" bill, which would require employers with more than 50 employees to display information about veterans' benefits and services in a place accessible to all employees. The PA Department of Labor and Industry would be required to publish standardized posters in a printable format with the information. This would help more veterans locate the services that are available to them.

I believe we have a duty to treat our veterans, who have sacrificed for our freedom, with respect and dignity. That is why I co-sponsored H.R. 335, which calls for the creation of the Pennsylvania Task Force on Agent Orange. This resolution was unanimously adopted by the House and will help PA veterans who were exposed to Agent Orange obtain benefits that are available to them through the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA).

In addition to my **H.B. 1401** that would expand the state's Disabled Veterans' Real Estate Tax Exemption program to provide proportional discounts as determined by the VA, I also co-sponsored **H.B. 1227** that would allow non-wartime veterans who are 100% disabled to get property tax relief.
